



ENVIRONMENTAL FIELD TRIP DESTINATIONS O'ahu

The Kōkua Hawai'i Foundation Field Trip Grants help bring students to outdoor sites where they can experience hands-on learning about Hawai'i's environment. The Kōkua Hawai'i Foundation offers financial assistance to Hawai'i public schools which otherwise could not afford to participate in environmental field trips. Most field trip locations provide hands-on learning experiences for students grades K-12 and offer educational tours that can be customized to any grade level.



BISHOP MUSEUM

Bishop Museum offers a wide range of programs in culture and science. Education programs range in length from 25 minutes to 1 hour. There are no additional fees for programs but generally have a limit of

no more than two programs per group. Hawaii-based, Pre-K through 12th grade schools are charged a flat rate admission cost. To request a visit, you must submit the application online at least 2 weeks prior to your earliest requested date.
